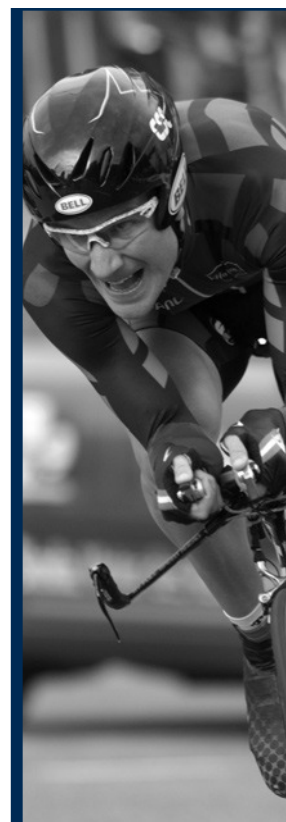

PERSONAL

One of the world's top individual time trialists, Dave Zabriskie is the only competitive cyclist in U.S. history to win a stage in each of cycling's three Grand Tours – the Tour de France, the Giro d'Italia and the Vuelta a España. Additionally, he's one of only four Americans to ever wear the Tour's yellow leader's jersey, joining the likes of Greg LeMond, Lance Armstrong and George Hincapie as the men who can make that claim.

Dave began competitive cycling as a high school freshman in Utah and later earned an invitation to one of USA Cycling's Regional Development Camps at the U.S. Olympic Training Center. Under the guidance and structure of USA Cycling, Dave was selected to become a member of the National Development Team, a Belgium-based U23 program that provided consistent European racing opportunities and world-class support. After posting promising results on the European race circuit as a developing athlete, he was offered a spot on the U.S. Postal Service Professional Cycling Team next to Lance Armstrong in 2001. With a UCI ProTour squad, Dave continued to develop into one of the best American cyclists of his generation.

In 2003 Dave survived a collision with an SUV that nearly ended his career while on a training ride in Utah. After the experience left him in a wheelchair for months, Dave founded Yield to Life, a non-profit organization devoted to creating a safer environment for cyclists through awareness and education.

POINTS OF INTEREST

- Dave holds the record for the fastest time trial in Tour de France history, averaging a speed of 33.97 mph over the 19-kilometer stage one of the 2005 Tour and beating Lance Armstrong by two seconds.
- Doctors told Dave he would never ride again after a serious crash in 2003 left him with pins in his wrist and leg and a cadaver's bone in his knee.
